
The Best Gift You Can Give to Others is Your Time



Earnest Money at Risk When Private Mortgage Insurance Denied

A couple of weeks ago, an agent that I coach called with an interesting scenario. She was working with a home buyer who

was successful in making an offer on a home and subsequently received an approval from a mortgage company. The buyers were thrilled and removed loan approval as a contingency for their purchase. Here's the catch.

The loan the buyer was approved for was for more than 80% of the purchase price which triggers a requirement from the lender for the buyer to acquire "Private Mortgage Insurance" (PMI) which would cover the lender in the case of the buyer's mortgage default up to the 20% balance.

This means that if the buyer defaulted and the property was ultimately sold for less than the loan amount, the insurance would protect the first 20% of loss. The buyer was putting down only 3% of the purchase price, so the PMI was on the hook for a maximum of 17% of the purchase price.

The Private Mortgage Insurance company denied their application.

The buyer could not get a mortgage without the PMI and they had already removed the mortgage contingency which placed their

entire earnest money deposit at risk.

I have NEVER seen a Private Mortgage Insurance application declined. It has been a rubber stamp. It's been essentially standard procedure for a 3% down purchase being accepted if the lender approved the loan. It wasn't a rubber stamp this time. The denial was due to the homebuyers' source of funds for the 3%.

The buyers found a local grant to help with the down payment and supplemented these funds received from their tax refund and stimulus check.

The PMI company felt too little of the 3% the buyer was putting down was from the buyer's earned funds and would be at a higher risk for loan default. The agent was able to help the buyers procure another PMI company that accepted their purchase financing, and the purchase was completed.

PMI rejection is incredibly rare, but here is the lesson: If you are putting less than 20% down on your purchase, do not release the finance contingency until you have the PMI approval as well.

The Reason for the (Racing) Season: RFID Tags

For many, the chill of the Winter season means hunkering down for human hibernation mode bulky layers, long

days spent inside with hot cocoa, hobbies revolving around comfortand Couch potato-ing. For others, Winter means gearing up for the end-of-year and imminent spring race season.

Fall marathons, turkey trots, resolution runs, and spring races dot the calendars of running enthusiasts. As runners count down the days to their next big run, they may also be counting minutes on the clock, aiming to get a PR (personal record) by running as fast as possible. But, how do runners - and races - track their times?

On a day-to-day basis, most runners employ a route-tracking

app from Garmin, Strava, Under Armour's Map My Run, or even the phone's own software. These apps use the phone's built-in GPS system to track metrics like location and speed. Some of the apps, like Strava, allow runners to compare their pace along common routes to those logged by other runners, or their own past attempts, and will alert runners if they've achieved a PR or ranked fastest among other users for a particular stretch of the route.

What about race day? Rather than relying on GPS tracking, most races now utilize RFID, or "radio-frequency identification" methods to clock a runner's time. RFID tags, or chips, are small, self-contained systems revolving around radio transponding, transmitting, receiving, and identifying. Back-of-bib chips are most common these days, though some races may feature shoelace tags or

Lighting the Chanukah Candles

There is a famous photo of a Chanukah menorah sitting on a German windowsill with a Nazi flag hanging

in the back. The photographer, Rachel Posner, was a Jewish woman who understood the significance of the juxtaposition in the Winter of 1932, just before Hitler came to power. She wrote on the back of the photo: "Death to Judah' so the flag says, 'Judah will live forever,' so the light answers."

As our days grow short and darkness reigns, our holidays of light come to answer the darkness and inspire us with hope. In Judaism, one of the main practices of Chanukah is "publicizing the miracle," or sharing the light of our Chanukah menorahs with the world. Sometimes you'll see a chanukiah outside the front door of a Jewish home or in a window facing the street so others can enjoy the light.



Transfer on Death Deed - DIY Beware

Death Deed, also
called a "TOD
Deed," is a way
to transfer

a home to a named beneficiary, effective at death, without a Probate. It is promoted as a "do-it-yourself" alternative to making a Trust (expensive) or adding someone as a Joint Tenant. The problem with adding a Joint Tenant is that person will have ownership rights with you during your lifetime. With the TOD Deed, the named beneficiary has no ownership rights until after you die. You can revoke the TOD or sell the property at any time, without involving the beneficiary.

There are strict requirements for signing and recording the TOD Deed. It requires two witnesses, it must be notarized, and the TOD Deed must be recorded on or before 60 days after it is notarized. After the person making the TOD Deed dies, the beneficiary is required to locate the deceased person's heirs (this may require hiring an heir search firm), send a required Notice, and record an Affidavit with the Death Certificate and statement under penalty of perjury that the required Notice

was given.

The beneficiary inheriting under a TOD Deed is personally liable for the deceased person's debts up to the value of the property inherited. There may be title problems with a TOD Deed because the inherited property may be subject to liens of the deceased person recorded up to 120 days after the Affidavit is recorded (which may be delayed by the Death Certificate or missing heirs).

I have had two experiences with TOD Deeds, and neither worked out well for the intended beneficiary. In my first experience (during-COVID-19 shutdowns), due to delays at the Recorder's Office, the TOD Deed was not recorded until 61 days after it was notarized – one day too late. We had to open a Probate. In another case, the TOD was signed without witnesses and never recorded. Again, we will have to involve the Court.

The TOD Deed is not necessarily simple, and a lot can go wrong. It should not be used without clear understanding of the legal requirements and consequences for the named beneficiary.

SMS: You became a model in the 1970s while also getting certification as a chef. How did modeling enter the picture? MJ: "The suggestion of being a model came from my high school sweetheart, Mary, and I just laughed. A year or two later I saw an ad in the paper: John Robert Powers was looking for males to attend their classes. I laughed again, but this time I went over and signed up. I did it for fun." SMS: Your culinary resume includes a simultaneous stint in the mid-1990s as a private home chef and an executive chef for numerous restaurants across the U.S. At the height of your tenure as a chef, you again changed direction. This time it was to commercial real estate, finding your niche in property management. What prompted you to leave the world of chefs?

MJ: "At 13, I got my first paycheck as a dishwasher at the Boston Naval Shipyard. It was there I knew I wanted to work in a kitchen. Over the years, everything changed in the F&B [food and beverage] business, too many bottom lines and also the workers' attitudes had changed. They either didn't take an interest in their work, or they wanted to be a 'celebrity chef' - after watching a couple of TV shows. A lot of other chefs I worked with also felt we were more like babysitters than leaders or teachers.

"It was in 1999, after a year with Delaware North's Roaring River State Park in Missouri, when I walked into my office at 1:15 a.m. and started taking a good look at my 'Wall of Encouragement.' While reading some of what I had accomplished in the business, I realized I'd been up the day before since 5 a.m., and in the kitchen by 6 a.m. I shook my head and said, 'I'm tired.' It was then that I made a goal to leave in five years (I would be 50). While with the Marriott Corporation, I had been taught to set goals in five-year increments: it's called 'WAYGIFY', or, 'Where are you going in five years?"

SMS: As both a commercial realtor and property manager, what do you most enjoy about the work?

MJ: "The daily variety of people and places - it's also a stable income, and now I don't need to go

after real estate deals, they just fall in my lap."

After a lifetime of successful endeavors, Maurice and his wife, Tess, had planned to become a realtor team in Palm Springs. once she'd received her license.

Becoming Resilient After Disappointments

Last year, when she was in third grade, my daughter Alexa appplied to be part of a leadership organization at her

school. This organization has a group of students who meet during the week and talk about ways to make their school better and how they can be good leaders. Not everyone that applies for this organization gets in. There is an application and an interview. When she first applied, she was not accepted. She knew she would have another chance this year. So, now in 4th grade, she reapplied and practiced her interview questions and was selected to be a part of the group.

What I have learned about Alexa over her nine years on this planet is that she appears to be quite resilient. I have mentioned more than once that her competitive side was evident as early as playing Candyland. If she lost, she wanted to play again. She was not happy she lost, and she did not complain, she just wanted another chance to win. With this leadership group, her reaction to not being selected has been consistent with similar situations she has faced. What's Happening With My Cat?

Q: My six-year-old,
spayed female cat
is acting like she
is "in heat" again,
(very vocal, espe-

cially at night). She was spayed five years ago. What are your thoughts?

A: Thanks for this interesting question. Over the past decade, I have seen this issue in both dogs and cats. There are generally two possibilities. When female cats are under estrogen influence, they generally become very vocal and may have odd behaviors including becoming very affectionate and rubbing against the owner and furniture aggressively.

One possibility is "ovarian remnant syndrome" where a piece of the ovary was accidentally left behind during the spay surgery.

During a typical spay, both ovaries and the uterus are removed. Often times, the atypical behaviors occur within one to two years after the surgery.

In your cat's case, I would be more concerned about another possibility, since it's been five years since the surgery. In some cases, we see female cats get exposed to women who are using supplemental estrogen creams.

They are often applied to the arms and other exposed areas on the woman. The cat then licks the estrogen cream from the owner's skin, which leads to estrogen ingestion and the concerning symptoms. This syndrome is more common than you might think and can be a challenge to diagnose unless the veterinarian questions the owner specifically about estrogen exposure in the household.

As this syndrome has been

Connect to Nature in December

The end of another year is fast approaching, and for many of us, watching our local wildlife has played a role in helping us through the ups and downs of uncertain times.

Birds, with their behavior and beauty, bring us joy when it can be hard to find it elsewhere and provide us with a connection to the shifting seasons. So, at the end of 2022, we take a moment and say "thank you" to the birds and wildlife, and look forward to a new year filled with discoveries from the natural world.

And, what could be more joyful than to see a Cedar Waxwing, a sign that a new season is here. If you have fruiting trees or bushes, Cedar Waxwings may descend on them in big flocks. A beautiful soft brown with dashing black masks and red-pointed wings, Waxwings are a colorful treat when they visit your yard. They sit close together on branches and have been known to pass each other berries. Consider planting Toyon (California Christmas Berry) or Coffeeberry to attract a flock to your yard.

Your fruiting bushes also may attract American Robins, who often flock with Waxwings in the winter. Well-known for their prowess as worm catchers, the robins also go for berries of all kinds, and will add their sweet song to your yard.

Look to the night sky mid-month to be amazed by the Geminid Meteor Shower. The duration of the shower is expected from November 19 through December 24, with the peak predicted for December 14. While urban lights over Los

Angeles County may make it difficult to view the meteors, there are great locations not far from the city center for excellent yearround night sky viewing.

As you gather with family this holiday season, there is a simple action we can all do to help the planet; reduce and reuse the materials you use for wrapping packages during the holidays. Use your creativity, and start at home to find materials to reuse, such as paper grocery bags, twine, and pre-used wrapping paper and bows. You can also use alternative packaging, such as mason jars and tin containers. This action will save you money and reduce the waste that might otherwise reach our landfills, waterways, and wildlife habitats.

So, as I remember my adventures with Barbara when we went to museums, or to sing around a piano at a golf course when her good friend was playing the piano, I will focus on all the positive memories I have.

We are so sorry to share sad news about Malibu resident, Kay Lehne. She passed away in the advanced stage of Alzheimer's disease last month. Kay and her husband, John, had been married for 63 years. They raised a wonderful family of three children and seven grandchildren. Kay had been a local home economics teacher. Eventually, Kay joined her daughter, Carolyn, and son, Steve, and they formed KC Restoration. In that business they restored buildings such as Union Station, Wilshire Boulevard Temple, and the Bullock's Wilshire Department Store, which was one of my favorite places to visit. 





even round-the-ankle braceletstyle tags. In a race, each RFID tag's inventory number is associated with a particular bib number. When a runner crosses the start line – the RFID timing mat – an electromagnetic interrogation pulse from the RFID reader registers the RFID tag in the bib, making note of the time that register has occurred. When the runner crosses the finish line, the RFID mat at the end registers the tag again. The two times allow for the official "chip time" of the runner, which may differ from the less personal "clock time" that only correlates with how long the runner has taken to cross the finish line respective to when the race started, not necessarily when they personally crossed the start line.

Some RFID tags work in shortrange only, requiring the reader (mat) to be very close by, but other tags feature longer-range tracking. In ultra-racing, these tags allow event staff to track if a runner has gone off-course, potentially needing aid - and also allow those staying comfy at home to track a runner along their route to the finish line and, if they can, time their own (likely) car-based route to show up in time to cheer at the finish line.




